B. <u>Course Objectives</u>: We will practice The Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) designated by the Texas Education Agency as necessary to comply with the Requirements to graduate from High School.

The **TEKS** include reading comprehension and writing skills. Reading being the key to education helps us understand concepts (big ideas, unifying themes, key fundamental understandings). The students will be expected to read to summarize, define, explain, explore, examine, identify, and analyze, the concepts of government.

The students will write to learn and learn to write using social studies skills, along with social studies terminology and concepts. The students will practice writing skills of sequencing, categorizing, cause-and-effect relationships, comparing, and contrasting, finding the main idea, summarizing, making generalizations and predictions, and drawing inferences and conclusions.

The development of oral skills will be practiced along with the writing skills, i.e., reading and/or presenting student assignments, etc.

- C. <u>Assessment:</u> The student's grade will be assessed by averaging minor assessments (daily classwork assignments) and major assessments (textbook section quizzes, chapter tests and major class projects) **Minor Assessments = 33% and Major Assessments = 67%**
- **D.** Classroom rules and/or expectations: Students should be prepared and on time to class, follow teacher's directions, write necessary notes that will help them remember information, review subject information, be assessed on understanding and knowledge of the TEKS, participate in the class discussions, and practice polite/respectful behavior.
